YEAR 13 INTERVIEW DAY

Event: Year 13 Interview Day

Date: Wednesday 22nd November 2023 Location: Wallington High School for Girls

We are organising a special event for our year 13 students and are looking for volunteers to join us to help them develop a crucial life skill: interviewing.

Interviewing is a crucial life skill that goes beyond just job applications. It's about effective communication, self-presentation, and confidence-building. For many of our Year 13 students, this will be their first opportunity to experience a formal interview setting and as you will appreciate, this is an important skill to learn to give our students the confidence and a competitive edge when applying for higher education, apprenticeships or other employment opportunities in the future.

We require volunteers from all sectors but we have a particular need for veterinarians, medical professionals, architects, and individuals with a background in foreign languages.

What to expect:

We are seeking volunteers to conduct multiple 30 minute face-to-face practice interviews. Your role will involve asking questions, providing feedback, and sharing your insights and experiences. Where possible we will match your specialism to an appropriate student but we may also ask you to conduct a generic interview or one broadly related to your field. We are happy for you to use your own questions but you will also be supplied with examples to assist you. We are hoping for volunteers to attend the whole day, however we would still welcome your participation if you are only available for part of the day. Lunch and refreshments will be provided, and for some this may also be a great opportunity to network with other professionals in the local area.

SCHOOL GOVERNOR VACANCY

You should have received a notification earlier in the week about a vacancy for a school governor.

If you would like to contribute to shaping the future of our school, the governors encourage you to consider nominating yourself to stand as a parent governor. They will welcome nominations from any interested parent/carer.

Nominations for the vacancy should be made by completing a response in the form below:

Parent Governor Nominations

The response must have a personal statement of no more than 200 words setting out why you want to be a governor and what you would bring to the role. This personal statement will be circulated to all parents /carers if a ballot has to be arranged. A ballet will be arranged if there are two or more applicants.

Nominees must also confirm that they are willing to undergo a DBS check (Disclosure and Barring Service, previously CRB) and that they are not prohibited from acting as a company director.

The closing date for applications is the 5th November 2023 by 12 noon.

VISIT FROM ELLIOT COLBURN MP

"In our PSHCE session last Wednesday, we were visited by Elliot Colburn MP for Carshalton and Wallington. At the start of the session, he highlighted his beginnings in politics, having studied it in school, and took us through his role in the government and within our constituency. Afterwards, he answered many of our questions in great depth even going beyond to answer anticipated questions from his explanation. Elliot also took a question on the future of our local hospital, St. Helier, and we learned that Sutton is getting a new hospital.

The visit was extremely helpful in enhancing our knowledge about MPs and what their job entails. For example, we learnt about how their work benefits and affects us as a local community and nationally, as we got to learn first-hand the day-to-day workload and responsibilities our MPs have. Moreover, it was interesting to hear about how MPs have a say in our laws and how they can differ from our preconceptions about the different parties and their views".

HANS WOYDA MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS

On Thursday 5th October a group of four students, Uma (9Sha), Jade (11Pan), Julia (12KMK) and Abigail (13PBD), represented Wallington in the first round of the Hans Woyda Mathematics Competition. This is a London-wide competition in which schools compete directly against each other, answering maths questions in a very short time. We played against Reigate Grammar School and it was an exceptionally close match. We were leading for most of the contest but lost out in the final round.

Our team work was excellent and we achieved a perfect score in the Team Round.

Institute of Cancer Research visit with Year 12s



In October a group of year 12s attended an open evening at the Institute of Cancer Research in Sutton. The evening started with two very informative careers talks, highlighting the routes in to research science and how these can work alongside a career in medicine. This was followed by a fantastic opportunity to tour the chemistry laboratories. Very passionate scientists talked the students through the process of cancer drug development, from concept through to synthesis, purification and modelling. A vast number of techniques and equipment were demonstrated and displayed, including NMR machines and X-ray crystallography. The evening culminated in a chance to take part in a variety of hands on activities, including pipetting and DNA extraction. This also gave students an opportunity to network with ICR staff with various roles, where they asked many questions. The evening was a real exciting look at the career of cancer research and I hope many of the students were inspired.

Duke of Edinburgh Launch 2023

We are hosting a parents' information evening for any students in Y9, 10, 12 who would like more information regarding the Duke of Edinburgh award at any level (bronze, silver and gold).

What is the Duke of Edinburgh Award?

The Duke of Edinburgh scheme enables a young person to elevate their self-confidence, skills and aspirations in a non-competitive environment. Employers have named the Award as the highest non-academic accolade they look for in prospective employees.

Students who enrol on the scheme will undertake four sections: Volunteering, Physical, Skills and an Expedition. For those students who wish to take part in the Gold scheme, there is also an additional Residential section. Each section must be done for a minimum period of time, which increases between the Bronze, Silver and Gold Awards. The Bronze award is open to Year 9. The Silver and Gold awards are open to all students in Years 10 and 12 respectively, regardless of whether they have completed any previous levels.

WHSG is a directly licensed centre which is supported by the operations team at London DofE. This means that we will coordinate the Volunteering, Physical and Skills sections in school and using an online portal. Activ Adventures, who have worked with WHSG and Nonsuch for the past four years, run the expedition section with training sessions in school. Alternatively, students may choose to join an open expedition run by London DofE or use another provider.

Bronze: For students in Year 9 and above. Enrolment fee of £35.50 + expedition cost. **Silver:** For students in Year 10 and above. Enrolment fee of £35.50 + expedition cost. **Gold:** For students in Lower Sixth. Enrolment fee of £42.50 + expedition cost.
