HALF-TERM READING WEEK

Half-term break should be used as a time for rest and relaxation. However, for the second week of the break we also encourage students to use this time to read. Our library is the go to place for book recommendations, both fiction and non-fiction, but if students and parents/carers want to learn about the science of learning, we highly recommend the Learning Scientists website (click here). This is an excellent website put together by cognitive scientists that details some of the key principles of effective learning, and includes practical strategies that can be used by parents, carers, students and teachers to make the most of their time and energy in the pursuit of subject mastery. The video section (click here) is particularly good at distilling key ideas and recommendations. Three great books to read about this topic include How We Learn by Benedict Carey, A Parent's Guide to the Science of Learning by Edward Watson and Bradley Busch, and Raise Your Grade by Dr Denise Gossage.

Knowledge is power. If students want to think well about a topic, they must know a lot about it. One of the best ways to increase knowledge and support subject mastery is reading. Please take advantage of this half-term to increase your power, by reading.



Between each coil, I call it low porosity and 4c But I wish that I could foresee all the unwanted opinions everyone else would voice to me


If my hair was too dry and short then it was nappy

It was lovely to hear the positive feedback from visitors about both our school and students.



This is a London-wide competition in which schools compete directly against each other, answering maths questions in a very short time.


We played against Nonsuch and it was an incredibly close match. We were leading as we went into the last round but unfortunately, they won the race section leading them to a narrow victory. We are looking forward to the next round in which we play Sutton Grammar.

Here are some examples of the questions the students faced....

Y7-11 1) The diagram to the right shows a circle with centre O and a square with side length 8 cm. Two vertices of the square lie on the circle and O is the midpoint of the opposite side.

The area of the circle can be written as $n\pi$ cm².

Find the value n.



Y12-13 2) In three dimensions, X, Y and Z are points on the positive x, y and z coordinate axes with origin O.

$$\angle OXY = \alpha$$
, $\angle OYZ = \beta$ and $\angle OZX = \gamma$.

Find the value of $\tan \alpha \tan \beta \tan \gamma$.

Well done to everyone who took part – we achieved a very impressive score!


NON-UNIFORM DAY CELEBRATE YOUR FLAG
