This week's assemblies were in response to our pastoral survey where a number of students highlighted that they were worried about their futures. JUNIOR MATHEMATICAL CHALLENGE

This term students from years 7 and 8 took park in the Junior Mathematical Challenge. This is a multiple-choice test that is sat by students across the UK. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems are challenging and designed to make even the most able students think!

The competition was tough this year and the thresholds for certificates were 84+ for Gold, 66+ for Silver and 52+ for Bronze. A score of 92+ meant a student would qualify to sit the Junior Kangaroo and a score of 120+ meant a student would qualify to sit the Junior Mathematical Olympiad.

It is a great achievement to have been awarded a certificate and we would like to congratulate and celebrate the success of the following students.










AROUND THE WORLD IN 60 MINUTES



KS3 MATHEMATICS/GEOGRAPHY SHOW

On Thursday 19th May a group of Year 7 and 8 students took part in a special workshop called "Around the World in 60 minutes". In the show, the speaker, Zoe Griffiths explored the people and places of the world around us, through a series of engaging maths activities. Students took part in a hands-on exercise, a magic trick and an audience experiment. The workshop covered mathematical topics including spherical geometry, fractals and Benford's Law, along with touching on human geography topics (such as the use of maps and populations) and physical geography topics (such as the nature of coastlines).


