Self-harm is behaviour that is done deliberately to harm oneself. Varying from one young person to another, it can include: self-cutting, taking an overdose, hitting or bruising, intentionally taking too little or too much medication, burning, hanging or suffocation. At least 10% of adolescents report having self-harmed in some way. This session is aimed at helping parents, carers, other family members and friends to cope when a young person is self-harming.

CLASS CHARTS

Since September we have been using Class Charts to record and monitor student behaviour. We are now in a position where we are able to launch student accounts which will allow them to log in and see their own progress and reflect on their achievement and behaviour. Students will receive information on how to set up their accounts during tutor time next week. Parent accounts will also be launched shortly and more information will be sent out in the coming weeks.

PUNCTUALITY

Good punctuality to both lessons and to school is expected of all students. We know that employers place great importance on punctuality and attendance, therefore it is important for our students to understand the value of being on time.

WHSG will issue same day, 20 min detentions for students that are late into school, without a valid reason or persistent lateness to classes. Parents and students will be notified as soon as possible of the detention and the reasoning by email.

We ask that parents support these actions as important processes for the school and understand that detentions cannot be moved for any after school clubs or enrichment events. Should a detention clash with a medical appointment, evidence will be requested for the school to show flexibility.

On 14th November, we were lucky to have a very informative presentation from the famous fashion retailer, AllSaints, during our computer science lesson. The UK headquarters of the British fashion retailer is located in London. AllSaints employs about 2,400 people in 27 countries and territories and offers menswear, womenswear, accessories, and footwear in 281 locations. During the lesson, Dara, Shannon and Kezia provided us with insights on their roles. This included talking through their day with us and each of their career journeys as to how they found themselves at All Saints. They also taught us how to create project planning flowcharts which helps the team organise and structure the tasks required for the company to be successful. We had two business analysts as well as one project manager come in and they talked about their daily work life and showed us how broad the computer science field is. It was good to know that there are so many different career options within the same company. The importance of teamwork and collaboration was also shown. INTERNATIONAL YOUTH MATH CHALLENGE

The International Youth Math Challenge is one of the biggest online mathematics competitions for students from all around the world.

We have very exciting news as Mugdha (8Bro) has recently taken part in this competition and had huge success! She took part in the qualifying round earlier on this term in which she had to answer six challenging problems that required comprehensive skills in mathematics, logical thinking, and knowledge. Her impressive

result in the qualifying round meant she was selected to take part in the final in which she achieved a Bronze Honour certificate and was placed among the top 25% of all participants. Solving these questions required comprehensive skills in several mathematical areas well beyond her age group. Well done Mugdha!



HANS WOYDA MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

On Monday 13th November a group of four students, Caitlin (Y9), Huda (Y11), Abhishree (Y12) and Naomi (Y13), represented Wallington in the second round of the Hans Woyda Mathematics Competition. This is a London-wide competition in which schools compete directly against each other, answering maths questions in a very short time. We played against Wallington Boys and it was an exceptionally close match. We were very close for most of the contest but lost out in the final round.

Our team work was excellent and this is the question we had in the Team Round...

Section 4 – Team Question

Time: 5 minutes

Your task is to express as many numbers from 1 to 40 as an arithmetic expression using the four digits of 2023 exactly once each. You can use the operations $+, -, \times, \div, !, (,)$ and powers.

You may also concatenate two of the numbers as digits to make a two-digit number, but you cannot make three-digit numbers and you cannot concatenate digits after manipulating them (so, for example, using a 2 and the 0 to make 20 is permitted, but using 230 is not, and nor is using 3! to make 6 then using the 6 and the 0 to make 60).

Each expression must use two 2s, one 0 and one 3.

You are reminded that 0! = 1.

So, for example, some possible answers (which you may not use) would be:

25 = 20 + 3 + 2
$20 = 20^{(3-2)}$
$3 = 3! - 2^2 + 0!$
