In school, you've probably been taught about Christopher Columbus, the *man* who discovered America? Ernest Shackleton, the *man* to voyaged to Antarctica? Marco Polo, a *man* who crossed continents? Maybe you've even heard of Captain Cook or fictional characters like Indiana Jones and Robin Crusoe? Did you ever ask why all the explorers that we learn about are men?

The answer is very complicated. In the past, most women were expected to stay home to cook, clean and look after the children. Women were not supposed to travel alone. Whereas men were taught that it was a man's job to fight, explore, fly, sail and be heroic.

Bravely crossing the desert alone



Robyn Davidson, from Australia, was a courageous, resilient and fiercely independent 25 year old explorer. She trekked over 1700 miles across Australia from Alice Springs (in the centre) to the Indian Ocean. Alone, except for her small flock of camels and a dog. Can you imagine being

alone for weeks and weeks at a time in the desert, miles from anywhere?

Junko Tabei, from Japan, was the first female explorer to ever reach the top of **Mount Everest** - the highest mountain in the world. She later became the first woman to climb all seven of the Seven Summits (the 7 highest mountains in the world).



Flying fearlessly through the skies

In the 1920s, no flying schools in the whole of the USA would consider teaching a black woman to fly. So **Bessie Coleman worked** two jobs to save money, and taught herself French in order to move to Europe and gain her International Flying Licence. Afterwards, Bessie travelled around Europe and USA flying in airshows. Sadly, she later died in a plane crash.

The United Nations says that there are **195** countries around the world today.

There are cities, towns, mountains, seas and deserts to explore.

Almost one third of the Earth's land surface is desert. This includes the polar regions - which are ice deserts. Much of the world does not have roads or railways. Explorers often need to trek across deserts, climb mountains and clamber through rainforest to discover new places.

Women have walked, run, sailed, driven, cycled and flown around the world. Some women have taken trains to cross whole continents, like the Trans-Siberian Express that goes from Europe to the edge of the Pacific Ocean.
