MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD TEACHER

Dear all,

I hope that everyone is staying safe and well during this second lockdown. Students have settled back into school very quickly following the two week half-term break.

An updated version of our school COVID safe operations and procedures was sent out to all parents last week highlighting the changes that we have recently made to our school procedures. In light of this, please can I draw your attention to a few requests:

Wearing masks in communal areas, such as corridors, is now mandatory for students and staff. Please ensure your child has a clean mask with them each day. If your child is exempt from wearing a mask then please inform their Head of Year.

Students are expected to sanitise their hands at the end of each lesson and after lunch and break. Please can you make sure that they have their own sanitiser in order to be able to do this.

We are still getting some students who are forgetting to bring in their lanyards – please can you make sure that your child has this with them each morning.

As part of this, we are committed to taking the following actions:

- I. Set up a Race Equality Steering Group within the Trust comprising students, staff and alumnae from all GLT schools to work on targeting areas of racial inequality in our schools.
- 2. Provide in each school access to help, support and advocacy for students who experience racial inequality and work positively with other agencies and organisations who oppose racism.
- 3. Ensure that everyone in our schools has access to resources and training and that we continue to develop everyone's learning and understanding of the issues facing minority ethnic students and staff.

We are currently setting up a Race Advocacy Group at Wallington Girls, which is being led by two members of staff, Ms Sepanya and Mrs Olulari. We will ensure that parents and carers are kept up to date with the work of this group.

Year II are currently taking their GCSE mock exams and alongside their A level studies, Year I3 have been busy with their university applications. Last week we had fifty-five students take their Oxbridge entrance tests including thirty-five students who took their BMAT exams for Medicine. We wish everyone every success with their applications.

Finally, over half term we had a new canopy installed in the quad (see photo). We will also be putting in new picnic benches along with potted trees and plants in and around this canopy, the idea being that the quad can become more of a social space for students when we are able to return to our normal routines.

PARKING AROUND THE SCHOOL

Please can I remind parents and carers that we enjoy a cordial relationship with our neighbours. Please be considerate if parking on the road especially when dropping off or collecting your daughter. KEEPING OUR STANDARDS HIGH

Students in most year groups buy food in outside areas and all students are expected to be outside at break time and lunch time, weather permitting. Most of our students continue to wear their lanyards throughout the day. If a student loses a lanyard a replacement may be bought from Reception for 50p. Students are aware they are expected to wear a lanyard on the day they have PE and at all times during the day whilst on school site.





ARMISTICE DAY

With the evenings drawing in, we start to look towards Armistice day; I Ith November 2020. This year we thought it would be interesting to look back at WHSG's own history and how that impacted the students at the time. We are living through such unprecedented circumstances ourselves, we may be able to better understand and empathise with these students had to go through.

The outbreak of the first world war in 1914 inevitable led to some changes in school life; Zeppelin raids interrupted lessons and the school had to cope with coal and food shortages. The girls raised money for the war effort through competitions, sales of craft works and small musical events. Many were involved in sewing splint pads which were sent to France for the wounded. There were shortages of books, paper and pencils and the usual Prize Giving and School Concerts were postponed. Suddenly, in 1918, the armistice was declared on the 11th November and the great war was over. The school had a half day holiday and the governors provided a treat by arranging a picnic in Carshalton Park. The celebrations were subdued and the food was sparse and unappetising but there was general relief that life could go back to normal.
