#### Message from the Head Teacher

#### **Dear Parents and Carers**

Welcome to our first edition of the Wallington Week whilst in lockdown. I trust that you and your families are keeping safe and that over the Easter break you had the opportunity to spend time together free from work or study.

We are aiming to continue with these weekly newsletters to everyone even though the school building being closed. We do not know how long this situation will continue (despite media speculation) and it is important to remind ourselves that we are all still members of a thriving school community, just in very different circumstances.

As a school we have been busy adapting to our new working environment. I hope that the changes we have made to our curriculum have helped to make the work more manageable and allowed greater flexibility. For now, we not considering delivering 'live lessons' to students (with the possible exception of A level students). This is because we need to ensure equality of access for everyone – we have a number of students with limited access to IT, students having to balance other commitments, such as looking after other family members, as well as a large number of my staff with young families at home and they to need to look after their children. We will of course continue to review our provision the longer the period of school closure goes on for.

You will already have received a letter regarding refining our pastoral provision and form tutors will start to get in contact with their tutees from next week by phone to see how they are and how they are getting on. Subject teachers may also now start to get in contact with students if they appear to be struggling with submitting work. Again, this is to check whether they are having any issues regarding the work and if so, how best to resolve or work round them.






#### **Cooking and Baking during Lockdown**
