# Message from the Head Teacher

# Dear Parents and Carers

The Department for Education has now published the confirmed and final results showing the overall performances for all secondary schools at the end of Key Stage 4 in 2018; in other words their Progress 8 score. I am very pleased to say that WHSG is the second highest school in Sutton, with a confirmed Progress 8 score of 1.04. This places us in the top forty secondary schools nationally. It is also important to mention that our Progress 8 score for students in receipt of pupil premium was even higher at 1.17. It is important to remember that we are committed to delivering the broadest possible education and so this perhaps makes these results even more impressive given just how many of our students are fully involved in the wider life of the school and the extra-curricular programme.

Unfortunately being able to maintain this quality of education is becoming more and more challenging for schools. Schools are now seeing the impact of the teacher recruitment crisis as well as tighter school budgets. The Sutton Secondary Headteachers are in support of the 'Worth Less' Campaign which has recently launched a petition demanding for greater funding for schools. ### First Aid Procedures / First Aid Room

We are continuing to see students in the first aid room with the following:-

- Period pains—please bear in mind (and remind your daughter) that we do not keep paracetamol in school other than that stored for individual students. The only thing we can offer is a hot water bottle!
- Colds and Coughs—we do not keep any cold or cough medication in the medical room or paracetamol (as mentioned above) so please encourage your daughter not to visit the first aid room with cold symptoms unless she feels she is really too unwell to remain at school.
- Sickness bugs—a reminder that, in order to prevent the spread of infection to both other students and staff, if your daughter has been suffering from vomiting or diarrhoea, she should not come into school for **48 hours** after the last episode.

If your daughter needs to take medication whilst at school, she should hand it in to the first aid room in an envelope marked with her name and form and instructions on dosage.
