# Message from the Head Teacher

Dear Parents and Carers

It was great to see so many parents at the Year 9 Options Evening last night and also at Mentoring Day on Tuesday. I hope that everyone found both events both very useful and informative.

A recent survey highlighted that around a third of our students have six or less hours sleep a night. Research suggests that adolescents need between 9 and 9 ½ hours of sleep per night. ### **Jack Petchey Achievement Awards**

As a school we are proud to support the Jack Petchey Foundation by participating in the Jack Petchey achievement awards each year. The Foundation recognises and supports the work of young people across the south east of England. Born and brought up in the East End of London Jack Petchey set up the Jack Petchey Achievement Award scheme in order to celebrate the work of students and others who have made a real difference to their school communities

### What is a Jack Petchey award?

Jack Petchey achievement awards are designed to recognise a wide range of achievements. It is not just about being clever, or gifted, but about putting the effort in and doing your best. Winners are nominated by their peers for their efforts in a certain category. They receive a certificate, a pin badge, an opportunity to go to the award ceremony and £250 to spend on something of their choice in school. All students can be nominated – from Year 7 to Year 13.

# Higher Education Day – 5 February 2019

Every year, our Year 12 students spend time considering their options after Year 13.

This week, fourteen universities came into school to run workshops for small groups of students on Choosing your course/ university, UCAS applications, Student Finance and Prep for a Personal Statement. This year we were fortunate to have 3 exstudents who are undertaking prestigious apprenticeships with the BBC, Accenture and Telefonica/O2 to talk about alternatives to Higher Education with Yvonne Fearnside, our external Careers Adviser.

Students started the day in their form groups thinking about what they wanted from the day and were then split into small groups for the first of 6 sessions. Questions included what part time employment opportunities there might be at university to how much an apprenticeship might pay and what it could lead to as well as what kind of disabled student accommodation was available. University Admissions Tutors were delighted with the depth and breadth of questions asked and commented on how well prepared our students were.

The day ended in reflective mood as students took time to think about what they had learnt and what their next steps might be. Initial feedback was very positive with one student commenting on the fact that the next 18 months will pass quickly and 'I will need to start making some big decisions about what I want to do in the future'.

In the evening, parents and carers were invited to attend to listen to Leicester University talk about universities and the differences between them. Mrs Watson outlined what happens behind the scenes at school, what support is available to students and the important dates to observe for university applications.

This was a very thought-provoking day for both students and parents and carers.







### Yr 10 Artificial Intelligence Residential Course

### 8th – 11th April 2019 University of Exeter – £165

The Smallpeice Trust has teamed up with The University of Exeter to offer a limited number of places to eligible students giving them the opportunity to attend the above residential course at a subsidised cost as part of the university's goal to widen participation to higher education. Eligible applicants, in addition to learning about the hot topic of Artificial Intelligence, will also experience life on campus as a student. To be eligible for these limited subsidised places, an applicant will need to meet the following criteria:-

### Parents/guardians will not have attended university

The subsidised course fee for these limited places is  $\pm 165$  (the full cost is  $\pm 300$ ) and includes 4 days full board, all course materials and social activities.

Students will take part in projects where they will explore the world of artificial intelligence, a branch of science which deals with helping machines to find solutions to complex problems in a more human-like fashion.

If you know of any eligible Year 10 students who would benefit from attending this course, please encourage them find out more and to book as quickly as possible as the places are on a first come, first served basis.
