MESSAGE FROM THE HEAD TEACHER

Dear Parents and Carers

It has been another busy and very productive week. This is the final week for Year II and Year I3 summer assessments for GCSE and A level whilst normal lessons continue for other year groups. After half-term we will be saying farewell to Year I3 with our Year I3 Leavers' Celebration on Friday IIth June. We are also looking forward to congratulating Year II on all of their hard work and endeavours during a difficult time on Thursday I0th June at the Year II Celebration Afternoon and book return.

As Year II and I3 will no longer be in school, there is no longer the need for school to have a staggered start and finish to the day, so a reminder that from after half-term, Year I0 registration will move to the morning so that the start of the school day for everyone will be 8.25am and finish will be 2.45pm. Other than a relaxation of the need to wear masks in classrooms, please be aware that all of our other Covid safety measures still remain in place. This includes year group bubbles, year group zones, regular cleaning and ventilation of classrooms as well as encouraging social distancing where possible.

We are still awaiting a delivery of LFD home-testing kits and it looks like we will now receive them after half-term. However we have been able to distribute our remaining home tests kits to Years 7 to 10. It is important that students continue to test themselves twice weekly over half -term so If you are in a situation where you are running out of tests, we strongly recommend that you contact the following government website to order some more free test kits.



Here at Wallington one of our House figure heads is named Pankhurst after Emmeline Pankhurst. Emmeline died on the 14th June 1928 and as we approach that date almost 93 years on we wanted to include some information about her life.











Women's Social and Political Union

The WSPU was a group led by Emmeline Pankhurst. Their aim was to gain **equal voting rights** for women. Emmeline gave speeches encouraging women to take action in order to achieve this goal.

Controversy


The WSPU, at the time, became known as a 'radical party', which means they used extreme methods in order to get their message heard. Because these methods were sometimes violent, WSPU members became the first women labelled as 'suffragettes'. Members were known to smash windows, damage public property and even start fires. This got many women in trouble with the police and some even sentenced to time in prison, where they were treated very badly. When the stories of bad treatment reached the newspapers, it actually helped to increase support for the suffragette movement.

The war years

In 1914 the First World War began. Emmeline Pankhurst encouraged WSPU members to put their demonstrations on hold, in order to focus on the war effort. Emmeline asked women to take up roles in factories in support of the men fighting. In response, the government released all WSPU prisoners. When the war ended in 1918, the **Representation of the People Act** was introduced, giving women over the age of 30 who owned property, the right to vote.

Later life

Although Emmeline lived to see some women gain the right to vote, she died on 14 June 1928, just a few weeks before a law was passed giving all women over 21 years of age the right to vote.




Padre João Paulo Gomes, a kind priest in Brazil, rescues stray dogs by sheltering them in his church and brings them to Sunday mass so families can adopt them
