
BOOK REVIEWS WRITTEN BY STUDENTS DURING THEIR ENGLISH LESSONS

In the book 'A Raisin in the Sun' by Lorraine Hansberry, readers are transported to the world of a struggling African American family in post-World War 2 Harlem. This powerful and thought-provoking work tackles themes of identity, culture, justice, and the pursuit of the American Dream. As we see from the reviews of Jaedah and Beth, this play has made a significant impact on the students studying it, inspiring them to approach sensitive topics with maturity and engage in discussions about the social and historical context of the play. Through this play, readers can gain a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by African American families in midtwentieth-century America and how these struggles continue to impact society today.

Reviews can be read below:

A raisin in the sun, the book that we're studying has themes of identity, culture, and justice that are enhanced by the embedded context of Harlem post world war 2. This book alone served to encourage our class to approach sensitive themes with maturity and shrewdness.

Intermediate Mathematical Challenge

This term, a selection of students from Year 11 took part in the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge. This is a multiple-choice test that is sat by students across the UK. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems are challenging and designed to make even the most able students think!

The competition was tough this year and the thresholds for certificates this year are 71+ gold, 55+ silver, 42+ bronze. Thresholds for invitation to follow on rounds were 77+ for Pink Kangaroo and 103+ for the Maclaurin Olympiad.




