

- Builds background








30 minutes reading for pleasure every day will...



The SHARP Referral System

- SHARP is the Student Help Reporting Page where a student can report any concern they may have regarding themselves or a fellow student.
- This may relate to academic worries or a potential safeguarding concern.
- Students are encouraged to report any incidents which occur within the school and local community.
- The system is anonymous, therefore, as much detail as possible is required if we are to investigate a concern thoroughly.



Smoothwall

- Smoothwall Monitor is a real-time, digital monitoring solution that flags incidents as they happen on the school network.
- The system will pick up on what students type, search and view on any school device, including when students use a school device at home.
- Staff are made aware of content that may indicate risk to a student such as cyberbullying, suicide, gang membership, violence, or an inappropriate use of school resources.



WHSG Code of Conduct

- At WHSG we subscribe to a culture where the highest standards of behaviour are upheld by all students so that that they achieve more both academically and socially.
- Where behaviour is of the highest standard, learning is of the best quality and learning time is maximised.
- Please work with us in creating a safe and engaging environment by ensuring your child is aware of and upholds the WHSG Code of Conduct.



Mobile Phones

- Year 7 and Year 8 students are not allowed mobile phones or watches with internet access or a camera.
- Students are not allowed to use their mobiles phones, or have headphones in sight, anywhere on school premises unless directed by a teacher to use them for a specific task.
- We ask that you support the school by ensuring that your child does not use their mobile phone in school and you do not attempt to contact them via their mobile phone whilst in school.
- Please contact the school office if you wish to get a message to your child.



Responsible Device Use

- No screens in bedrooms and no devices for at least 2 hours before bed.
- Encourage an open conversation about the sort of content your child is putting online.
- Try to keep up-to-date with which apps your child is using.
- Devices encourage procrastination and reduce productivity even after their use, so communicate with your child about making the best of their time when working/ revising.



Attendance and Punctuality

It is expected that all students aim for at least 97% attendance each year. At WHSG:

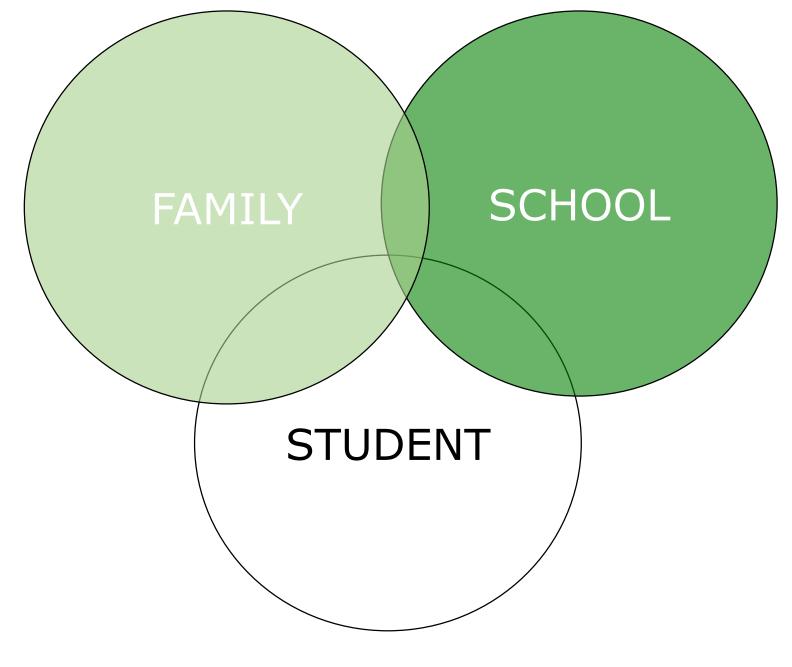
- 97-100% attendance is defined as expected
- 95 96% attendance is defined as satisfactory
- Below 95% but above 90% is defined as a cause for concern
- Below 90% is defined as a serious cause for concern

Absence

- The School's Attendance Officer (Years 7-11) must be informed on the first day of absence before 8.45am via email from the parent/carer (sent from the same email address currently notified to us on our administrative system), and every subsequent day before 8.45am if the absence continues.
- If there is no communication from parents/carers, then this will be automatically recorded as an unauthorised absence.

It's important that the students know that support is always there, and where to go should they need it.







How to help manage worries that arise


- Prevention is better than cure a supportive environment at home and school can stem the tide before it becomes overwhelming.
