Y13 DESTINATIONS 2024



- 232 Accepted places and off to University/1 Music Conservatoire (16 gap year/re-apply)
- 211 students (85%) accepted onto their firm choice & 22 students 9% accepted onto their insurance choice
- 3 students are beginning Apprenticeships
- 12/16 Oxbridge (6 Oxford & 6 Cambridge)
- 148 (64% of accepted places) attending Russell Group Universities
- Universities with greatest numbers attending: Kings College London (19), University of Warwick (16), University of Southampton (13), City University of London (13), UCL (12), University of Bristol (12), Imperial College London (12), Queen Mary University, London (10), University of Birmingham (10)

ETHOS FOR SUCCESS



Students should:

- take **responsibility** for their own learning and teaching
- have a clear **purpose** and be clear about what they are expected to achieve
- have **high expectations** and set high standards for themselves
- see themselves and staff as a collectively and mutually **cooperative** and supportive unit
- be supported by **excellent attendance and punctuality**
- understand effective ways of learning
- Be **intellectually curious**, doing work/research/reading beyond the curriculum



ACADEMIC MINDSET



HOW IS LIFE IN THE SIXTH FORM DIFFERENT



- Greater specialisation and academic rigour
- Greater responsibility for students own learning
- Greater independent and self-directed learning
- Matching every hour of taught time with independent study
- Greater freedom and greater responsibilities
- Importance of balancing other commitments with study and time management



ADAPTING TO SIXTH FORM



Top 8 problems students encounter when moving into Sixth Form:

1. Unrealistic aims in light of past application e.g. 'I got my GCSEs okay therefore the same approach will deliver post-16 grades'.
 2. Slow shift to mode of independent work/study
 3. Punctuality issues to school and lessons – more adult independence
 4. Inadequate time-management (Study periods, study leave, jobs, social life, hobbies)
 5. Poor understanding of need for work outside of the classroom
 6. Inability to produce A-Level extended writing in coursework or in examinations
 7. Wrong choice of course – not suited to style of learning or future pathway
 8. Social pressures of new peer groups, adjusting to freedoms of a young adult!
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GOOD HABITS



- Study sessions need to be scheduled on an organised timetable.
 - Encourage your daughter to create a regular routine and encourage good homework habits, such as:
 - No studying after 10pm
 - Work away from their phone!
 - Working from a hard copy of the textbook where possible, not a digital one – this removes the temptation to search for answers/mark schemes or worked answers online.
 - Expect to complete at least one hour of independent study for every hour taught in school
 - Leave for school early, being late is off putting and more likely to forget things

ASSESSMENT



- Assessment is an integral part of learning
 - Research informed approach
 - Frequent, short, ‘low stakes’ checking for understanding (Formative Assessment)
 - Feedback can take many forms
 - Reflection and improvement
 - Only ‘key’ assessments for reporting and Mocks will be graded
 - 2 Summative Assessments throughout Y12 (Autumn 2 Common Assessment and Year 12 End of Year exams)
 - Year 12 exams (May 2025) – Significant in determining UCAS grades for university applications

Apprenticeships – Visiting companies, opportunities sent via email to students

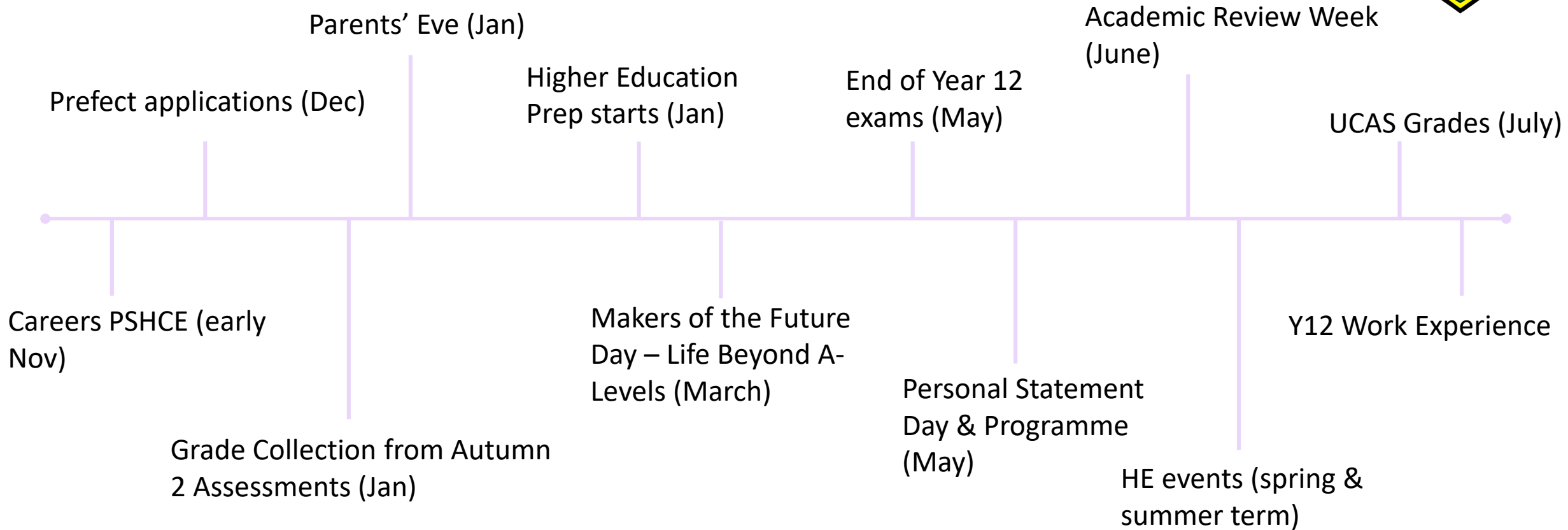
HIGHER EDUCATION



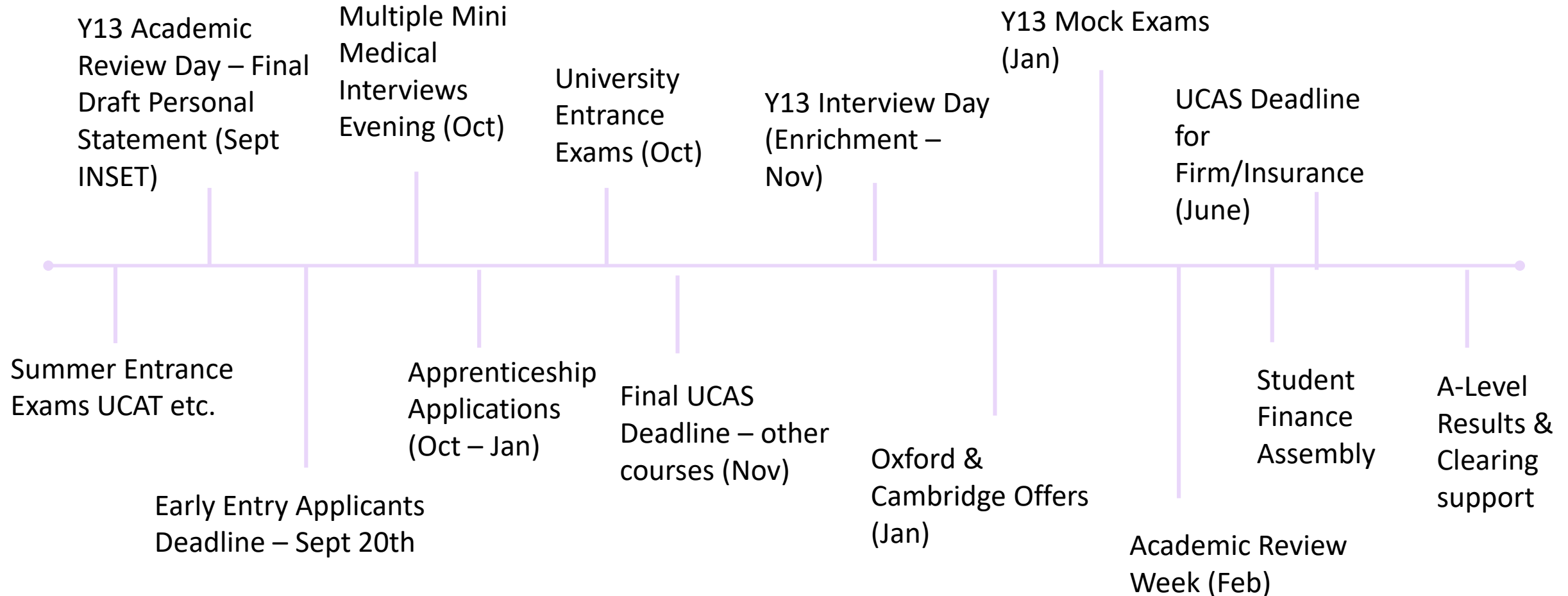
- Students will begin UCAS applications for University in June/July of Year 12
- UCAS Application deadlines are:
 - ✓ September of Year 13 for Oxford, Cambridge, Medicine, Veterinary Science and Dentistry (Early entry applicants)
 - ✓ November of Year 13 for all other courses (Law students encouraged to apply as early as possible)
- UCAS Grades are grades given to students in the last week of Year 12. These will be sent to Universities from the school as part of the students UCAS application.
- UCAS Grades are predominantly made from students 'End of Year 12' exams, therefore Year 12 is a very IMPORTANT YEAR! UCAS grades are decided on by the school, students/parents are not allowed to have influence over these

Y12 WORK EXPERIENCE



15 July – 19 July 2024

- Compulsory for all students, within school time
 - Students will be sent a letter outlining what is required and how to have their work experience authorised in the next few weeks.
 - All Work experience to be logged onto UniFrog, system for student, work placement and school to authorise the placement
 - Use family friends as contacts
 - Email, ring, call
 - Competition is fierce! Start now for next summer...
 - You will refer to your work experience in your personal statement when applying for university or interviews for Apprenticeships/Jobs
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SUPPORT



- **Form tutor** with regular 1-1 mentoring
 - **Tutor time** programme focused on transition in Year 12
 - **Higher Education:** workshops by universities, mock interviews, personal statement day, visit to UCAS convention, parents' info evening, student finance tour, university taster lessons, Makers of the Future day (Higher education fair)
 - **Medicine:** talks/workshops by universities, links with Medic Portal, active Medical Society, mock MMI event
 - **Oxbridge:** regular support meetings, interviews with Oxbridge alumni, subject specific discussion groups and interviews, opportunities for networking
 - **Careers:** careers evenings, access to employers and apprenticeships providers, PSHE time dedicated to careers, 1-1 appointments with careers adviser
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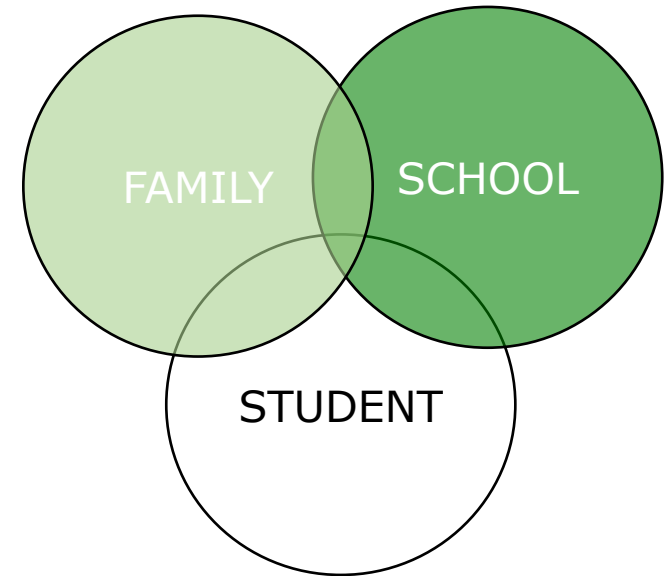
COLLABORATION
